



Protect Kids from Hot Cars.

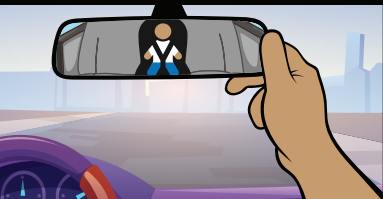
Kids and cars heat up quickly. Children heat up 3-5 times faster than adults in cars. Never leave a child in a vehicle, as temperatures can become dangerous even on mild days. Flip over for ways to protect kids from being locked in hot cars.

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Look before you lock.

Never leave a child in a vehicle unattended; rolling windows down or parking in the shade does little to change the interior temperature.



Create reminders.

Place your essential items, like your phone, in the backseat when traveling with a child and check the back seat every time you park to ensure no one is left behind.



Lock them out.

Keep vehicle keys away from children, teach them not to play near vehicles, and discuss with family and neighbors the importance of locking car doors, especially in hot summer months.
